## 2021 NATIONAL RAMBOUILLET SHOW & SALE 2021 NATIONAL JUNIOR SHOW HEALTH REQUIREMENTS

All rams born prior to February 1, 2021 must have a negative ELISA test for B. ovis within 30 days of the sale, with the negative result listed on the CVI, along with a copy of the individual lab test result for each ram entered. The premise ID, individual scrapie number and flock number, as well as the result MUST BE STATED ON THE HEALTH CERTIFICATE.

All rams must have a written statement of the CVI that the veterinarian issuing the CVI palpated the testicles of each ram and no abnormalities were found.

All health papers must be completed within 30 days of the sale, with 20 days being preferred, in order for those papers to be good on sheep that must travel longer distances to arrive at their new destination after sale.

Sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope).

- (A) All sheep, including exotic sheep and antelope, regardless of age or gender, bartered, exchanged, gifted, leased, or sold entering Missouri must be free of symptoms of infectious or contagious diseases.
- (B) All sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope), regardless of age or gender, must be individually identified by official scrapie identification as defined in Title 9, Code of Federal Regulations, Part 79, published annually in January, herein incorporated by reference and made a part of this rule, as published by the United States Superintendent of Documents, 732 N Capital Street NW, Washington, DC 20402-0001, phone: toll free (866) 512-1800, DC area (202) 512-1800, website: http://bookstore.gpo.gov or any other means of identification approved by the state veterinarian identifying them to the flock-of-origin and listed on a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection. This rule does not incorporate any subsequent amendments or additions.

- (C) Flock-of-origin sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope) consigned directly to a licensed Missouri market/sale or a slaughter establishment must have individual official scrapie identification identifying them to the flock-of-origin.
- (D) Scrapie-positive, suspects, or high-risk animals may enter Missouri for immediate slaughter only and with specific approval from the state veterinarian.
- (E) Sheep (including exotic sheep and antelope) from a scabies-quarantined area must be dipped or treated by an officially approved method within ten (10) days prior to entering Missouri.

\*\*\*Please provide two (2) copies of the certified veterinary health inspection certificate as well as two (2) copies of the ELISA B. ovis negative test result for each entry that you have. Please have your veterinarian make those copies so that they are legible and are easily read. ENTRIES WITHOUT COPIES THAT ARE EASY TO READ AND VERY LEGIBLE WILL NOT BE ELIGIBLE TO BE SHOWN OR SOLD. \*\*\*

Copies made by the ARSBA copier/printer are usually not clear enough to read.

HAVE YOUR VETERINARIAN VERIFY ALL REQUIREMENTS WITH THE MISSOURI BOARD OF ANIMAL HEALTH PRIOR TO COMPLETING YOUR HEALTH CERTIFICATE(S) AS REQUIREMENTS/RESTRICTIONS ARE ALWAYS SUBJECT TO CHANGE DUE TO SPECIAL SITUATIONS THAT ARISE WITHIN A PARTICULAR STATE ON SHORT NOTICE.

ALL TRANSIT ANIMALS MUST ALSO HAVE HEALTH PAPERS available for inspection in accordance with Missouri health standards and rules and federal law. These animals must be segregated and penned in a separate area away from all sale entries as well as junior show entries.
